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In January 2015, Chain of Hope and Chain of Hope Jamaica conducted an outreach clinic around Jamaica, to scan the hearts of children and babies from rural areas.

36 of these had previously received treatment at Bustamante Hospital for Children in Kingston, and 11 came for a diagnosis.



Dorrian's Story

Dorrian was born with his arteries the wrong way round in his heart and needed an urgent operation. He was due to receive open heart surgery during a Chain of Hope cardiac mission to the Bustamante Hospital for Children in Kingston, however due to equipment failure at the hospital, Chain of Hope organised and sponsored Dorrian's urgent surgery in the UK.





Dorrian's story highlighted the great need for investment in a cardiac centre for the children of Jamaica and the surrounding Caribbean. At his check up at the Outreach Clinic, Dorrian was doing very well!

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Vital Medical Equipment

We were delighted to donate a brand new portable echo machine, worth US \$100,000, to the Bustamante Hospital for Children. Used to scan the heart, this machine will be essential for future outreach clinics to check up on the patients around Jamaica.



Donating equipment is a key part of achieving our long-term vision of a sustainable cardiac service in Jamaica as it will enable the local team to operate independently.
